Players have the option of laying up in front of the bunker on the right side of the fairway and away from the pair of bunkers on the left or they can risk trying to clear all the bunkers. Wind direction, speed and hole location will dictate what strategy is chosen. The green is a steep back to front slope.

The longest par 3 on the course. A slight ridge protects the front part of this green. Club selection is critical here to carry the ball to safety. A well placed tee shot to the center of the green assures par.

AUGUSTA NATIONAL #16

Augusta National #16 is known as Redbud - originally designed by Alistair Mackenzie in 1933. It was redesigned in 1947 by Robert Trent Jones. In 1954 Ben Hogan three-putted to lose a playoff to Sam Snead. Jack Nicklaus birdied the 16th on his way to his first Masters win in 1963 and his last Masters win in 1986. More recently the 16th was witness to what some say is one of the greatest shots in golf. The near impossible chip Tiger Woods holed to take the lead and eventually win his 4th Masters championship.

OAKLAND HILLS #5 Formally open in 1918 Oakland Hills already enjoyed a certain degree of prestige. After all, the course was designed by the foremost golf course architect of his day - Donald Ross. Although many tournaments have been held at Oakland Hills, the one which gave the course its greatest reputation as "The Monster" was the 1951 Open. Ben Hogan won by shooting a final round 67, after which was quoted as saying "I am glad I brought this course, this monster, to its knees" and "The greatest test of golf I have ever played and the toughest course."

Take aim at the right edge of the first bunker beyond the fairway with a 3-wood. Try not to cut the dogleg - it doesn't pay. Approach shot plays somewhat longer than the actual yardage and the green is tightly bunkered left and right.

FIRESTONE #16 One of the longest par 5's on the PGA Tour, Firestone's 16th hole is a beautiful tree-lined and narrow par 5 that plays mostly downhill. Firestone's South Course, which was designed by Bert Way and was built in 1929, is an annual stop on the PGA Tour and has hosted Major Championships for both the PGA and Champions Tour. A recent memory might be from the 2000 World Golf Championship - NEC Invitational, where Tiger Woods hit the now famous "Shot in the Dark" on the 18th hole to secure his victory in the event.

Slight dogleg right. A successful tee shot should favor the left side of the fairway. Pin positioning will dictate how aggressive the 2nd shot can be. A matching set of bookend bunkers, protect both sides of this elusive green.

A reachable Par 5 for the long hitter. A left center tee shot is ideal on this fairway. Those who gamble here should be aware of the 4 pot bunkers that guard the left side of this green. Those who lay up will have a reasonably short approach to an elevated two-tiered green. Birdies are available here.

A straight forward Par 4 demands two good shots to reach the green. Off the tee, favor the right center of the fairway to a generous landing area. The green is well bunkered in the rear and left side.



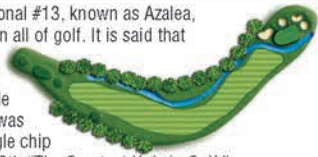

TPC SAWGRASS #17 In 1978, the PGA tour members voted to purchase a 415-acre tract that is now the TPC at Sawgrass and construct the first "Stadium Course" built specially for a PGA tour event. Conceived by former PGA commissioner Deane Beman and brought to fiery life by Pete Dye, one of the most influential architects of the last 50 years. No hole is more memorable, more photographed, more famous than the Par 3 17th at the stadium course.

AUGUSTA NATIONAL #13 Augusta National #13, known as Azalea, often viewed as the best-designed hole in all of golf. It is said that Bobby Jones "Saw" this hole the first time he looked at the Fruitland Nurseries property that would become Augusta National. The final hole of what has become known as "Amen Corner". It was here in 1936 that Byron Nelson sank a 50-foot Eagle chip in his first Master's title. Curtis Strange calls the 13th "The Greatest Hole in Golf."

OAKMONT #3 This turn-of-the-century facility opened in 1903 and was designed by Henry C. Fownes and has been established as a National Historic Landmark. Oakmont has hosted many golf championships, including the National Amateur, The PGA Championship and seven U.S. Opens. Oakmont gained additional notoriety for its "Furrowed" and "Church Pew" bunkers during the 1973 U.S. Open. Johnny Miller established the U.S. Open eighteen-hole record with a 63 in the final round in 1973, regarded by some as the finest round of golf ever played.

This Par 4 is a slight dogleg to the left. The right hand fairway bunkers sit 250 yards out from the back tees. An ideal drive would be left center of this fairway. A well placed iron shot will avoid the 2 bunkers protecting the right side of this green.

This short picturesque Par 4 features a tree-lined fairway down the left side. A well placed tee shot carries the corner and sets up an opportunity for a birdie with a short iron. Danger lurks, however, with 4 blind pot bunkers guarding the right side of this green.

Long 3-shot Par 5 puts a premium on accuracy off the tee. Positioning the 2nd shot through this narrow tree-lined fairway will help your approach. Avoid the kidney-shaped bunker that cradles the right portion of the green.

There is a slight dogleg to the right on this long Par 4. The tee shot should favor the left corner of this fairway, this avoiding 2 bunkers that complement the right side. A mid to long iron second shot plays downhill through a chute to this narrow green sloping back to front.

This challenging Par 3 has 2 large white pines guarding the right side of this hole. Check wind direction and choose enough club to avoid the bunker guarding the right side of the green. Birdie opportunities are lurking here!

BAY HILL #18 Built in 1961 and originally conceived as a private getaway for the original investors. In 1965 the investors invited Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Don Cherry and Dave Ragan for an exhibition match to promote the club. Arnold Palmer fell in love with Bay Hill that day. Small wonder, he shot 66, seven strokes better than his nearest fellow competitor, Nicklaus. In 1976, Arnold Palmer purchased the Bay Hill Club & Lodge, and it has been the winter home of the Palmer family ever since.
